#### Hub Club ADT...by Kelly Chuman

Three years ago, we opted to try and have a different kind of show for us. Attendance at our annual dirty harness day had dwindled each year and we believed that the club was looking for something different. I suggested we try an Arena Driving Trial and give an option to add an extra dressage test to your day to give the drivers and opportunity to get feedback and try again, practice a test for an upcoming show, or even try out a test at the next level. To make the show friendlier for beginners we added a Novice division, which allowed readers in dressage, a shorter cones course, and even less pressure in the obstacles. We also offered to the Novice drivers a change to walk any or all of the courses with a more experienced driver.



While I am no stranger to the challenges that comes with running a show, I have found these last three shows to be all challenging in new and different ways. I wanted to reward the drivers who had also attended the spring clinic the two years that we had it, so I was sure to incorporate elements from Sterling Grayburn's cones lesson into the cones courses. Personally, knowing the challenge of navigating a sea of blue barrels I painted each portion of the obstacles in bright colors and found other ways to colorfully mark our barrels. The next year I wanted to find a way to make it easier to divide the 20-cone cones course into two sections, Novice and Training and up, so I found a convenient natural break in the Fox Valley cross country course. We also wanted to bring in an actual driving person to judge dressage, so we coordinated with our clinic so that Trish Demers would judge on Saturday and be our clinician on Sunday. This was a personally rewarding experience as I was also able to get feedback from her on my course designs. This last year I made efforts to reach new people to try and make the show sustainable, as we had lost money the previous year.

We held our third HUB Club ADT Plus at Fox Valley Saddle Association on July 14<sup>th</sup> on a very warm and sunny day. Despite moving the show to Sunday so that no one would need to take a day off of work to help me set up, I only had three people help set up on Saturday. I want to thank MaryAnn Carter, Lydia Gray, and Michael Chuman for helping me set up the entire dressage ring, cones and obstacles. Also special thanks to Lonnie Schuetz, Judy Dowling, and Kris Breyer for making a wonderful lunch for us on the day of the event and a dozen others who helped with the actual running of the show. Lastly, a big thank you to the people who loaded up their horses and came to the show. I know that many of you only came because you want to see driving continue in the area, even if this show wasn't exactly the kind of driving you were interested in. I appreciate you and what you did for these shows. Each show also came with several hugs from competitors who were looking for a friendly place to start and felt like this was exactly what they needed. Almost everyone who attended had fun and admitted to learning at least a few new things.

Regretfully, each year had fewer entries and more having to beg people to enter so that we would cover our expenses. For this reason, I will not be running another show in 2020. 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#### My New Ride at the ADT...by M. Chuman



I have been lucky enough to do the Hub Club ADT the past couple of years. Since Kelly runs that, I get to go play with a horse and have some fun. This year had been so wet and I had not had much of a chance to drive my horse so when the day came up for the ADT, Kelly asked if I wanted to drive her horse Bert instead of Sugar. While I have such fond memories of last year's dressage test when Sugar apparently became super afraid of pickup trucks and decided to stay as far away as horse-aly possible from it, not helping my dressage score one bit since there was a truck at C and the judge was sitting in it, I decided to take Kelly up on her offer and drove Bert.

While we've had Bert for awhile, I had only driven him once (for just long enough to turn him into a noodle in our cones area) prior to deciding to use him for the show. About a week before the show I drove him for the first time in years. It was a bit eye opening. I'm not sure if people are aware, but horses can actually turn. This was news to me. It was like going from a super tanker down to a large yacht. It took some getting used to for sure, plus Kelly and I have different driving styles...like she is good at driving, and I'm usually pretty funny and can play the guitar better than her. So we practiced dressage for several days while she gave me pointers on what Bert responds best too and how to use my hands and aids better and soon the day of the ADT was at hand.

The morning went pretty well. I was somewhat happy with my dressage test and really got him to do a nice free walk on one of the diagonals. Cones went well as I only got a teeny bit lost, then Kelly kicked me off the carriage and drove a dressage test as well. I beat her by like half a point, but only because he had already done dressage and cones and the old man was getting tired. The afternoon was a bit more of a struggle as I'm not used to being able to turn and may have gotten some white paint on the carriage.

At the end of the day, it was a neat experience to drive an unfamiliar horse. I had gotten used to the way one horse feels and moves and acts and having something new made me have to be a better driver. I had to think differently and drive differently. When I walked the cones or obstacles I had to think differently as he is slower in some ways than Sugar, but can turn better than she can so he is faster in other ways. It forced me to become a better driver and to rethink some of the things I do when I drive my horse; so if you get an opportunity to spend some time with a different horse, it may be worth your effort to try.

Also...thanks to the organizer and all the volunteers for the day so I could play.

It was a soggy Saturday for Fox Valley Saddle Association's Driving Games Day. Kelly Chuman organized several driving games in the morning, gave us a lunch break and had several more games in the afternoon. We started the day off with orienteering. There were four letters hidden all around the grounds of FVSA (hmm...I wonder what four letters they might have been) and with a compass and some bearings we set off to find them. He's interested in driving and actually drove a dressage test at the Hub Club ADT last year and has driven at the county fair for several years. With his help we were able to find all the letters and went onto rainbow bingo cones. That's a course of colored cones set up and as you drive though one set, a color would be called out and you had to drive though that color and as you did that, another color was called and you had to drive though that color and so on. The random pulls couldn't have been worse as they kept me in tight turns. Even the 2<sup>nd</sup> to the last pull, where I only had two colors to pick from which were opposite turns, I picked one and started my turn and it was the wrong one because of course it was. Then we had obstacle **anyone to take pictures**. course that made us open mailboxes, back the carriages,

drive our wheels between two narrow beams and set up a knocked down cone with our carriage wheel. I set it up perfectly with the front wheel, just to knock it back down with the back wheel. Mad skills.

In the afternoon we did variant of a barrel pattern, but as you rounded the barrel you needed to take a fishing pole and fish out some "fish" that were in buckets on top. The more fish you caught, the lower your time would be. I made my navigator also be my fisherman and Samuel got three fish, which would have been more if I didn't drive like a crazy person. We also did a stop and go barrel pattern that had you weave though the barrels and stop and stand in a small box at the end. We also did a trivia town and country course that had us stop and answer questions throughout the drive. It was super fun. The questions were a mixed lot and included harness parts, what you should have in your spares kits, names of drivers at the WEG and we even had to name two Disney horses. It was super fun. I made Samuel answer most of the questions...mainly cause I was cold. She did all the set up herself...in the rain so the couple of drivers that showed up could have fun and play some games that we don't normally get to play. It was really a fun and low stress day. So a brave shout out to club members Linda Fidler, Lonnie and Reiner Schuetz, and Judy Dowling who all froze to the bone with me out there.
