

for an "ADT *Plus*" Saturday, August 11 and clinic Sunday August 12, 2018 at the Fox Valley Saddle Association in Hampshire, IL

Patricia "Trish" Demers owns and operates Carpe Diem Farm in Prescott Valley, Arizona, the home of the "happy horse." Trish is a trainer, clinician, judge, evaluator, instructor, course designer, and can appraise carriage, harness, and turnout. Working with beginning drivers (and riders) is her specialty, whether the discipline is combined driving, pleasure driving, or recreational driving, for show or for fun. In fact, she stresses SAFETY and FUN when she educates, and the farm motto is: "Try Hard, Win Humbly, Lose Gracefully."

Trish works with everything from minis to drafts, equine to mules to donkeys, and singles, pairs, tandems, and more. Her philosophy in training is to incorporate natural horsemanship methods which make a horse look forward to willingly working and understanding his job with gentle, quiet obedience.

--The clinic will be held at the Fox Valley Saddle Association, 44W300 Rohrson Rd., Hampshire, IL, which has an indoor arena, outdoor arena, and outdoor grass field for cones and obstacles, weather permitting.

--Saturday's classes are \$60 and Sunday's private clinic lessons are \$120, payable to The HUB Club. Refunds for cancellations will only be given if the slot can be filled.

--Participants may show and clinic out of their trailer for a daily haul-in fee of \$10 or out of a permanent stall for a daily stall fee of \$25. Bedding is not included and is NOT available for purchase on-site. Everyone is kindly asked to clean up after their horse when they leave whether hauling-in or using a stall.

--Lunch is included for paid clinic participants (and one groom) as well as paid auditors who sign up ahead of time.

--Anyone riding on a carriage must wear properly fastened protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM/SEI standards for equestrian use.

-- A negative Coggins test dated within one year of the event is required. Out-of-state horses must present a Veterinary Health Certificate dated within 30 days of clinic.

The HUB Club is having a potluck dinner with Trish Saturday after the show where she will give a presentation - *Carriage Safety: Common Mistakes I Driving and What NOT to Do*. This event is open to all members and Sunday paid auditors.

FVSA Day of Driving, July 14, 2018

July 14th was the first of three "Day of Driving" shows at Fox Valley Saddle Association that are being held this year in Hampshire, IL. Many of our Hub Club members either attended the show or were working the show. Competing in the morning at the driving derby was Lydia Gray, Kelly Chuman, Jane Helmboldt, Linda Fidler, and new member Krista Ziec. In the afternoon we were joined by Tammy Carlo and Grace Froelich-Grubb. The show was organized by club member Mike Chuman and the judge for the driving derby and all-around volunteer was another new Hub Club member, Jessica Kellenberger who didn't get to compete but totally tested out the course with her mini the night before…which was a huge step for both of them.

The morning of the show consists of a driving derby. A derby is just two portable CDE type obstacles and a cones course all mashed into one fun drive. We do a walk/trot division and an open division for each size equine. We break up by horse, large pony, small pony and VSEs. If you are driving a multiple you can compete against the singles or go in a division all by yourself. For the most part, we do follow ADS rules when it comes to the derby. Gloves, a whip, a helmet, and a navigator are required (except for small ponies and VSEs). We want the vehicle to be safe and the bits and harness to be within the rules. We encourage safety vests, but not required.

What's really cool with the derby is the variety of the runs that you get. There is a quiet elegance (sometimes mixed with a little non-turning terror) of Lydia and Newman going through the course, which is totally different from the way that Kelly drives Bert...gas pedal mashed with the thunder of a half draft. Linda and her horse started out years ago ground driving the course and now she trots through (when she can keep him awake :-) and to see the improvement she has made in the past few years has been amazing. Watching Jane navigate the tight obstacles with her Morgan and her big fancy Meadowbrook really showed off her skill as a driver, and then there was Krista "I hate the number 8 and am gonna smash it to bits with my tire" Ziec. It was her first horse show and she did great, driving like a pro...a pro who wanted to smash number 8.

In all seriousness, the derby is neat to watch. As there is no set course through the obstacles, those of us who get to watch the show are always amazed by the different paths a driver chooses. A big draft will drive the same obstacle way differently than a mini. As the drivers get two runs on the course, they can take what they learned on the first run and apply it to the second run or try something totally different and be surprised at the time difference. Hopefully it's faster and not slower.

After lunch we move to the show ring. We do a working class and a reinsmanship class. Lydia was kind enough to judge it for us this time. She had the classes working in the ring and tried to bring out the best in each of the drivers. We do dress up in the afternoon in our driving best and the outfits and hats that are on display in the ring are always amazing to see as are the different kinds of carriages and driving styles. Tammy had several "4-year-old moments" with her horse, which makes sense as the horse is 4, and Grace, like she always is, is a quiet picture of class and grace (pardon the pun) and is still the person I ask any etiquette question to.


After the ring classes we still had 3 more classes to go. We had a cones course that seemed somewhat challenging but smooth to drive. We also had a Town and Country/Trace Pace hybrid drive. It's a drive

around the grounds of usually between 1.5-2 km that is judged on your knowledge and ability to gauge your horse's pace. We measure the course and we have an optimum time based on the size of your animal. It's either 14, 12, 11, or 9 km/hr depending on if you are driving a horse, a large pony, small pony or mini. We don't tell you the optimum time or the length of the course until the end so you do really need to know your pace. The optimum time is new to us last year. We used to just have it based on speed but didn't want for it to be a race. We wanted people to spend some time learning these speeds as it's helpful in pleasure shows and the marathon portion of CDEs (At training level Section A for horses is 14 km, section B is 12 and 11 for ponies and 9 for A & B for minis). So far, the record for closest to optimum time has been 7 seconds slow. Just 7 seconds over 2 km and several minutes of driving. Super impressive.

Our last class is new to us this year and it's an organizer's choice. We added this as a way to introduce some different things into our show that drivers that just do small local shows might not see. There are so many cool classes in the ADS rulebook. I know that a ride and drive has been asked for...which seems mean to minis, but we could make them do things like a picnic class (which seems just all out mean—unless someone brings me chicken), or freestyle reinsmanship or gambler's choice. This past show we did a scurry course, which were 10 sets of cones that had to be driven in any order and only once as fast as possible. Want to know what the next one is going to be? Check out Fox Valley Saddle Association's Facebook page the week of the show.

We have two more shows this year. Our next one is on August 18th and then we have one on October 6th. We are skipping September as I will be at the WEG watching the drivers. What we try to offer at this show is a fun, educational and safe place to show. While we have many driving veterans on the box seat, we want to be as opening and welcoming to new drivers as possible. We've been several people's first show and try to take a relaxed, friendly and helpful attitude. This is our fourth year of doing this show and it's been so awesome to watch the growth of divers. We seem to have a core group of people at most of the shows that have really become my driving family. There was a driver who was eliminated her first 3 times in the derby and the next year when she came and won her division, my heart melted and I couldn't have been prouder. There was a diver who had done nothing but small shows and fairs and I'm pretty sure had never seen a whip or a helmet before start asking about and researching CDEs. We've had someone coming back from an injury who found confidence again at the show. Then there are people who just like to come out, have a good day with their animals, hang out with their friends, and put some miles under their belt.

Questions about string gloves. Is it proper to have them if there is no rain predicted? And, in a two wheele cart with a passenger, where do I put the string gloves then?

I had a chat with John Greenall today ringside at a horse show. I specifically asked him about string gloves, since there was quite a bit of conversation about it on this forum recently. What he said was this: This is pretty new to Carriage Driving Equipment and comes from foxhunting and sidesaddle tradition. There are no written rules about wearing string gloves specifically, so it is subject to judges interpretation. In his opinion, string gloves are displayed for any driver, in any vehicle, any time, regardless of weather conditions. They are to be displayed on the right tucked under the seat. Ideally they are not pinned to the seat because they need to be readily and easily accessible in the event of a sudden shower. When you think about trying to hold your lines, be mindful of your horse and Attempting to unpin a pair of string gloves from your seat this makes perfect sense. They are to be worn over the leather glove.


THE QUIRKY HISTORY OF THE MEADOWBROOK

If you've ever tried Googling for the history of the Meadowbrook Cart you've probably found a distinct lack of information. This dearth of information is because Meadowbrooks used to be classified as a Road Cart and/or Long Island Cart. So where did it all start?

Gigs, two-wheeled carts that were fast and light, were being used in Europe as early as 1791. They were particularly popular with fashionable young men, who viewed them as the sports cars of the day. In America, gigs were also used but there was a need for a lower hung vehicle that was a bit more practical for everyday use. In 1885, Charles A. Ellison of Mineola, Long Island, New York, filed a patent for a cart that would be comfortable for everyday use. His design wasn't perfect though and it continued to evolve until in 1891 he began advertising the Mineola Cart. Structurally it was a pretty simple cart and was advertised as such:

The Mineola Cart



Your attention is called to the following features of the Mineola which make it the most desirable cart on the market: it carries two passengers; it has an equalizing spring under the front bar that positively prevents any horse motion; one-half of the seat opens out, making it a very easy cart to get out of or into; and does away with the serious objection of having to climb over the shafts or bars; it is in increasing demand for Ladies' Driving as there is ample protection for their dresses, and the cart is as easy to get into and out of as a phaeton.

The quirky part – this advertisement ran in the carts were advertised as being built in Whitney Point,

the *Queen County Sentinel* on Long Island but the carts were advertised as being built in Whitney Point, NY, some 200+ miles away.

With the basic concept provided by the Mineola Cart, there were several vehicles which followed – Henry M. Willis' East Williston Cart (1891), the Maplewood Cart from the catalog of J.T. Clarkson & Co (1912) and the Hempstead Cart (1900). Robert H. Nostrand's Hempstead Cart was originally advertised in *The Hempstead Sentinelas* 'the new Meadow Brook Cart' but due to a feud between Nostrand and fellow Hempstead-based carriage maker David B. Tod, Nostrand's cart became known as the Hempstead Cart. And then there was Plate No. 30, The Beauty, an 'easy-riding road cart' that came in five different styles from the East Williston Cart Co. The style of theses carts collectively became know as "Long Island." They rode well over rough ground, were very suitable for use by ladies and they were appropriate for business or pleasure.

Where then did the name Meadowbrook come from? It has been suggested that Long Island Carts became known as Meadowbrook Carts because they wee often used to follow the famous Meadowbrook Hounds (NY) through the countryside. The name was certainly established by the time Francis M. Ware wrote *"Driving"* in 1903, which includes a picture of a early Meadowbrook being driven by

a young lady.

What is primary difference between the Meadowbrooks of today and those of the past? The overall design has stayed the same – low-hung, entered via a hinged seat, usually made of natural wood with large fenders – but the shafts have changed. Today's shafts typically do not absorb as much motion of the horse, lacking the flat or horizontal springs that made the original carts so smooth.


