

Team Lucas Takes the Next Step

The last weekend of July took Team Lucas to Hermitage Farm in Goshen, Kentucky for a combined USEF Elite Athlete and Developing Athlete Clinic with US Coach Thorsten Zarembowicz. The three clinic days were then followed by the Hermitage CDE at the end of the week. Along for the ride came Hermoso, aka Herman, a horse that I borrowed to show at the Hermitage CDE as well (more on that in a bit). So my days were filled with working and caring for two single horses in addition to trying to get organized for the show and get all the tack clean.

During the clinic, Thorsten evaluated the progress Lucas and I had made since our last sessions at the June clinic in Paris, KY. As with all athletes, there is sometimes forward and sometimes stalled progress. I had been struggling the last few weeks with Lucas being a bit resistant in the bridle and not as round in his frame as we had been in the previous months. So Thorsten took us back to some basics. Together we played with some minor adjustments in Lucas's bridle, looser noseband, and bit, less curb chain. This helped some and we were back on the forward path by the end of the lesson.

This really reminded me on how much things can change with training and that adjustments may always need to be made.

The following day, was a cones lesson. Thorsten had set up the cones course from the Chablis show held in France this past June. The course was complicated but fun. Because I am making the first big step up to FEI at this show, the cones were set at a mere 20cm clearance for my course runs. My first attempt at this course I only took one ball down and was over time by 5 sec. Coach Thorsten was very pleased with this. On our next runs, Thorsten started to throw some curve balls at us by trying to disrupt my focus while I was on course. He would purposely stand in my way (kinda like a game of chicken!), stand on a set of markers and then move to another set, and in general mess with my focus. It was a great exercise and one that I really needed and need more of!

The final clinic day Thorsten had me try a different bit on Lucas. A snaffle variation to encourage Lucas to be softer in his jaw, to mouth the bit more, and to encourage him to improve his lateral flexibility and eventually work over his back more. All of the end goal in this is to unlock and out more of Lucas's talent. Thorsten gave us several exercises to work on daily. One of them I have termed the 'wet noodle'. The 'wet noodle' consists of constant circles, turns, direction changes, etc. and *never* a straight line. All of us drive straight WAY WAY too much. So Thorsten challenged us to only use ½ of the 100m dressage arena. After 20 min of this exercise with frequent walk and stretch breaks, improvement was starting to be seen. Lucas had an even froth on both sides of his mouth where typically he has more on the left than on the right side. Also our rein contact was more consistent left to right and his left bend was more even through his whole body. We finished this lesson with a practice run of the FEI 1*B test that we were going to be doing at the upcoming show later in the week. The next couple of days, Tuesday and Wednesday were filled with practicing what we had learned and trying to keep improving on it all. These days also started to give us a taste of what the weather was going to be like for the upcoming show as temperatures and humidity started to leave the lovely mid 80s and creep up to low 90s which is typical KY August temperatures. Wednesday afternoon the remaining member of Team Lucas joined us in Kentucky, as groom and help Terry Shaw arrived at Hermitage Farm. It was now show time and this was our next big step.

At the Hermitage CDE I was attempting to complete my FEI 1* requirements. In order to compete at the FEI Advanced level in a full CDE (FEI 2*), an individual must successfully complete two FEI 1* events. The definition of 'Successful Completion' is just not getting eliminated, withdrawing, or retiring. A specific score does not need to be achieved per the current FEI rules. An FEI 1* event consists of

just dressage and cones. The chosen dressage test for this event was the FEI 1*B test which is basically a challenging Preliminary level dressage test. The cones are driven at FEI clearance of 20cm and FEI cones speed of 250 mpm. Marathon is not required. Drivers that have driven at the Advanced level before this rule entered the FEI rulebook have been grandfathered in. But those of us that had not previously driven Advanced need to complete this step. That was the purpose of this show. Complete my FEI 1* requirements. To do that, I was driving Lucas and I was borrowing a horse, Hermoso, aka Herman from Dale Huston. Herman is a 6 yr old KWPN gelding that Dale had acquired last fall. Herman was green, lacking show experience, and just needed to learn how to be a show horse. I was fortunate that I was able to start working with Herman in May and got to know his training holes and challenges. But since he was naïve in the horse show world I wasn't sure what I was going to have at the show. So we proceeded forward with showing two single horses in the FEI 1* to try and get my requirements out of the way at one show.

Thursday afternoon at 3pm was the FEI formal jog. This is the first time the jury will see you and your horse(s). This is probably the most stressful part as if your horse is determined "not fit to compete" you 'do not pass go' you 'do not collect \$200' you get to go home and not play! To not pass the jog is termed as 'spun'. You don't want to get 'spun'. So while dressed in a pair of your best pants, a show jacket plus a fancy hat, and shoes not meant for running, you present your horses clean, braided and in a riding bridle to the jury. The Jury walks around your horse, looks the horse over paying attention to things that might be of concern such as swellings, or sores, etc. The identities of the horses are checked against their passports and microchips, and then you trot the horse down and back on the jog strip while the Jury evaluates soundness of the horse and you hope you don't get run over by your horse spooking at the flower pots, or expressing exuberance and moments of opinion! Mind not that its 91 degrees, and 50% humidity and sweat is running down your body soaking the inside of your jacket. Lucas behaved well during the actual jog, despite causing everyone to clear away from us in the staging area with his moments of self-expression and exuberant outbursts. Herman required a second trip down the jog strip since he was too busy looking at the flower pots the first time to trot a straight line. But in the end both horses were pronounced "fit to compete"! WHEW!

Dressage day for everyone was Friday. Herman was first of my two entries to go. Despite my attempts the previous few days to acclimate and familiarize Herman to the dressage ring area, he was very focused on the judge's gazebos going past them. Although once the gazebos were hidden by his blinders he was focused on me again. When we were on centerline or diagonals he was very good. Overall I was pleased with him as his issues were minor and nothing that more show ring experience couldn't fix. The important part was we got a score. Lucas's turn was a little later in the day. Lucas went in and performed his test like the experienced show horse he is. The most important part was we had two dressage scores and were half way through our FEI 1* requirements. Lucas was currently in 1st with a 44% and Herman was in 4th with a 61%.

Because marathon was not required for the FEI 1* I opted to not put that additional stress on my team to learn hazard routes etc. Plus the temperatures that day were brutal at 95 degrees and 50% humidity. Instead we lended our efforts to other drivers that had done the marathon and needed assistance cooling out some really hot horses coming in with temps of 107 to 108! In the end, all horses at the show recovered well and were fit to compete the next day.

Sunday was cones day. Barry Hunter was the course designer and he presented us with a VERY challenging cones course. Because I was driving two entries, and Lucas was the higher placing entry after dressage, I was the second competitor to drive the course in the morning. One ball down and a few time penalties and I had my first FEI 1* requirement completed! Herman's turn was approx. an

hour later. Herman went into the ring a bit wide eyed again, and I struggled to get his attention and thus steering in the start of the course. But once he realized I was there for him, he settled in well. I had planned on taking longer routes with him and giving him the best trip possible for a green horse. In the end we only had 3 balls down very early in the course (2, 3 and 6) and some time penalties to place second in cones, and my second qualifying score!!! My FEI 1* requirements were met! In the end Lucas won the FEI 1* class and the Best FEI Dressage Award. Herman after cones moved up to 3rd but just 0.7 points out of 2nd place. Not bad for a green horse that had never seen a show ring before! I was pretty proud of that horse in how much he grew up in the week we spent in KY. So now that my FEI 1* requirements are met we can move on to the FEI 2*. Our plans are to do our first FEI 2* later this fall if all goes well. Stay Tuned! *Jennifer Thompson, DVM*

Drive On!

A program for both competitive and non-competitive drivers

Who Can Join? The *Drive On!* program is open to anyone who drives their equine for pleasure.

You must be a HUB Club member. You must pay an individual lifetime recording fee of \$20 that provides you with an official log sheet to get started.

What Hours Count? Record the time you spend driving or training your equine(s) to drive.

Awards: As you accrue hours, special certificates, and gifts are awarded.

Certificates are given after logging 50, 75, 150, 300, 500, 750, 1000, 2000, 3000, and 5000 hours with your equine.



Guidelines:

1. Horses must be owned/ leased by the HUB Club member submitting points.
2. Drivers must be HUB Club members for each year hours are logged.
3. You must pay a one-time \$20 enrollment fee.
4. The equines names must be included on your log sheet.
5. Once you are registered in the program, there is no limit to the amount of time taken to achieve award hours.
6. More than one equine may be driven for overall hours.
- 7. The HUB Club prefers results on official club or ADS Hours to drive log sheets or easy to follow Excel forms submitted by December 1th of each year.**
8. Awards are based on hours logged.

HUB CLUB YEAR END HIGH POINT GENERAL GUIDELINES

To be eligible for these awards, horses must be owned/ leased by the HUB Club member making the entries. All riders or drivers of the horse(s) must be current HUB Club members. To be eligible for awards, the submitting member must have been in attendance at one HUB Club meeting during the **competition year**, which shall be from **December 1st to November 30th of each year**.

A nomination fee of \$10 per division (horse or exhibitor) must be paid before any points will be counted. Results must be submitted on the appropriate entry forms, along with appropriate documentations for each division, by **December 1st** of the competition year. Entry forms may be duplicated by the participants. The Hub Club will not accept event results from prior years or incomplete entry forms. A copy of the prize list or program from each show/ competition entered must be submitted with your competition entry. To ensure a level playing field for all participants, a show prize list must include: rules and class specifications, dates, times, names of judges/officials and show secretary name and contact information, fees (entry fees, late fees, stall fees, etc.) and prizes. Please attach each prize list to the entry sheet for that show. Results may be audited and proof of placings may be required. If there is a significant difference between the number of points reported by the owner and the results reported by the show secretary, the entry will not be accepted and the horse will not be eligible for the program the following year. All decisions by the HUB Club are final. All high point records are available to any HUB Club member upon request.

No year-end points will be awarded to any horse that does not meet the age requirements for competition as defined by the American Driving Society or the United States Equestrian Federation. Club or show year-end awards will not count.

The High Point System is broken into two divisions: Carriage Pleasure and Combined Driving.

A. Carriage Pleasure Shows

All driving classes in rated and unrated pleasure shows count towards the high point. Championship classes will count double. Shows using multiple judges/points will only count for one set of points. Exhibitors may use the highest placing for their points. Overall show championship awards that are based on an accumulation of points will receive 10 points for champion and 5 points for reserve champion if they are specific to a division. Table A is used to tally points in carriage pleasure shows.

B. Combined Driving Events

A carriage year-end award is presented at CDEs, ADTs, HDTs and combined tests where each phase (dressage, marathon, and timed obstacles) is considered a class, and the final placing is also counted as a class. For shows to be counted in the CDE division, the show prize list must designate the competition as a CDE, driving trial, arena trial, or driving test. Shows without this designation will be counted in the Carriage Pleasure division. An entry in this division shall be defined as a particular driver/ equine combination. Competitors receive points for each phase (dressage, cones, and marathon) and points are accrued in the overall placing of the event. Division Champions will be awarded 10 points and 5 points for Reserve Champion. Table B is used to tally points in Combined Driving Events.
